EXECUTIVE ORDER 007 - 2023

AN ORDER ESTABLISHING THE TERRITORIAL BROADBAND COORDINATION, OPPORTUNITIES, REDEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT OFFICE, ESTABLISING THE BROADBAND STEERING COMMITTEE, AND REPEALING EXECUTIVE ORDER 006-2023

Section 1: Authority

This executive order is hereby issued in accordance with the powers and authority granted to the Governor by Article IV, Sections 6 and 7 of the Revised Constitution of American Samoa, and the American Samoa Code Annotated, Section 4.0111 (b).

Section 2: Preamble

WHEREAS, access to broadband is essential to the prosperity and quality of life of everyone living in American Samoa;

WHEREAS, broadband is vital to commerce, the economic vitality of communities, and American Samoa's global competitiveness;

WHEREAS, President Biden announced the \$42.45 billion Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program which enable States and Territories to expand high-speed internet access by funding planning, infrastructure deployment and adoption programs in furtherance of the Administration's "Internet for All" initiative;

WHEREAS, broadband is vital to the delivery of education, health care, transportation services, public safety, emergency response, and other critical services;

WHEREAS, broadband is vital to creating an inclusive infrastructure that addresses the needs of people with disabilities, the elderly, minors and the community as a whole;




BCORD OFFICE

Established by Governor Lemanu Executive Order 007-2023 under the Department of Commerce to coordinate and support territory-wide efforts on broadband to increase the affordability, availability, adoption and effectiveness broadband internet. of Through partnerships and collaborations, the BORD Office encourages investment in opportunities for broadband programs and initiatives that focus on improving the quality of life for the people of American Samoa based on its territorial strategic goals and objectives broadband development.



A program to help tribal communities expand highspeed Internet access and adoption on tribal lands. MIDDLE MILE

\$1.00B

Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Infrastructure

A program to expand middle mile infrastructure, to reduce the cost of connecting unserved and underserved areas.

FCC to administer \$14.2B

For Affordable Connectivity
Program, which replaced the
EBB program

USDA to administer \$2.0B

Via the Rural Utilities Service

Private Activity Bonds \$0.6B

Authorizes State and local governments to use private activity bonds for rural broadband



Digital Equity Funding Overview:

Select Digital Equity programs details

Three federal grant programs

- 1 State Planning Program: A \$60M formula grant program for states, territories, and tribal governments to develop digital equity plans.
- State Capacity Program: A \$1.44 billion formula grant program for states, territories, and tribal governments. It will fund an annual grant program for five years in support of digital equity projects and the implementation of digital equity plans.
 - Note: US territories other than Puerto Rico and Tribal / Native entities have separate funding allocations and different programmatic requirements for the State Planning and Capacity Programs
- 3 Competitive Program: A \$1.25 billion competitive grant program. It will fund an annual grant programs for five years to implement digital equity projects. Several types of entities can apply for these funds.

"Eligible Entity" refers to all 50 U.S. States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and other U.S. Territories (including the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands)



"Subgrantees" are entities that receive grant funds from an Eligible Entity to carry out eligible activities – this includes traditional Internet service providers, electric coops, nonprofit orgs, public-private partnerships, public or private utilities, public utility districts, Tribal entities, or local govts

The DE program funding focuses on the lack of access to affordable and reliable highspeed internet for certain covered population groups:

Matching Requirement: No matching required

Target Groups:

- 1. Low-income households
- 2. Aging populations
- 3. Incarcerated individuals
- 4. Veterans
- 5. People with disabilities
- 6. People with language barriers
- 7. Racial and ethic minorities
- 8. Rural inhabitants

Potential Projects:

- 1. Develop, implement and oversee digital equity plans
- 2. Sub-awards to help develop digital equity plans
- 3. Improve accessibility and inclusivity of public resources
- 4. Implement digital equity plans
- 5. Digital literacy and skills education to covered populations
- 6. Facilitate the adoption of high-speed internet by covered populations

Funding pool \$2.75B

Three programs that provide funding to promote digital inclusion and advance equity for all. They aim to ensure that all communities can access and use affordable, reliable high-speed Internet to meet their needs and improve their lives.

PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHTS

The Digital Equity Act created three programs:

State Planning

 \$60M formula funding program to develop digital equity plans

State Capacity


 \$1.44B formula funding program to implement plans
 & promote digital inclusion

Competitive

 \$1.25B to implement digital equity and inclusion activities

Example eligible uses of funds include:

- Developing digital equity plans; states must develop a plan to be eligible for state capacity grants
- Implementing digital equity plans and related activities
- Making awards to other entities to help make digital equity plans
- Providing digital literacy and digital skills education
- Improving accessibility and inclusivity of public resources
- Facilitating the adoption of high-speed Internet

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Example eligible uses of funds



- Make awards to other entities to help in developing digital equity plans
- 3 Improve the online accessibility and inclusivity of public resources

- 6 Provide digital literacy and skills education to covered populations
- 6 Facilitate the adoption of high-speed Internet by covered populations

- Planning Funds \$150,000 awarded June 1, 2023 to:
 - Develop the Territory
 Digital Equity Plan;
 - Conduct data collection and analysis, digital inclusion asset mapping and stakeholder engagement;
 - Staff recruitment and development
- Final allocations to be determined (end of June 2023)
- Designed to be sub-granted to ELIGIBLE ENTITIES

DIGITAL EQUITY & AMERICAN SAMOA...next steps

- American Samoa is taking a complementary approach to create both our Digital Equity Plan and BEAD 5-Year Action Plan.
- Our advantage: we have the American Samoa Territorial Broadband Strategy that identified priorities through local engagement with various stakeholders
- We are looking for a Digital Equity Coordinator!
- **DIGITAL EQUITY PLAN** is due 1 year from the award date.
- Funding is designed to be sub-granted to **ELIGIBLE ENTITIES**
- Because it is a lot of money: tons of rules and regulations on how we have to set up a competition, a challenge process, and then award the funding to sub-grantees.
- Timeline: June 2024-December 2024 will be the likely timeframe for allocated projects to start, with competitive projects to follow after if the awards are secured.
